


Who Will?

Root River Plan

Everybody Loves Raymond: We are working with a landowner in Raymond to restore stream banks on the Main Branch and convert existing farmland to wetland.

Lease Is More: There are more than 10 projects that have been completed or put under conservation lease agreement through the Racine County Land Conservation Department and USDA/NRCS.



Spawning Ideas: Working with the City of Racine and Inter-fluve, we've submitted a grant proposal to design a restored ravine, which is currently eroding and depositing sediment into Colonial Park's floodplain. With some work, that same wetland could be spawning habitat for northern pike.

Hope Floats: We're working with Racine County to explore how Midwest Floating Islands and their sustainable product might reduce phosphorus and nitrogen – and the algae on the beach they generate – at Quarry Lake Park.

Diversions Tactics: Root-Pike WIN has publicly stated our disapproval of the Waukesha Diversion return flow option into the Root River, and voiced new restoration and monitoring requirements that should be incorporated if the diversion occurs.

Pike River Plan

Back to School: Together with RA Smith, Root-Pike WIN will be managing the design of an oak savanna and ravine restoration of a critical stretch of the School Tributary.

Common Corps: Working with Kenosha County, we have engaged the United States Army Corps of Engineers to begin exploring possibilities for the restoration of common interest areas of the South Branch.

Good "Clean" Fun: Root-Pike WIN helped sponsor the Pike River Cleanup where volunteers picked up tons of trash and significant log jams were removed in order to prevent more streambank erosion and increase fish passage. What fun!

On the Job Training: We're working with Carthage College to formulate an internship program that helps conduct water quality testing for specific projects to gauge before and after results to help build stronger cases for restoring this watershed.




Diversity Training: On a tour with UW-Parkside professor David Rogers, Both the Cross Country Course and Natural Area adjacent to the UW-Parkside campus were assessed for their impact on the Main Branch. We're looking at restoring some highly-eroded ravines feeding into the Main Branch and enhancing the plant diversity.

Beneficial Barriers: Working with the USDA/NRCS and Kenosha County, we are moving options forward on a 100-foot riparian barrier restoration along a mile long stretch of the School Tributary.

Wind Point Plan

Point Taken: The completed Watershed Restoration Plan was submitted this year to the DNR and EPA... and we're optimistic that approval occurs later this fall. Even without a formal approval, Root-Pike WIN is moving Wind Point projects forward...

Cliff Notes: With Racine County, we are in the early stages of planning for Cliffside Park – a wetland and ravine restoration that would reduce erosion and pollution loading that makes its way into Lake Michigan.

Oak Creek Plan

Meeting of the Minds: In cooperation with SEWRPC, two stakeholder meetings have already been held as part of the Oak Creek Watershed Restoration Planning process. More than 100 people have participated so far. Contact us if you want to get involved!

Pike Creek Plan

Up a Creek: We've begun fund-raising to ultimately produce an EPA Nine Key Element Watershed Restoration Plan for the Pike Creek watershed, which includes Pike Creek, Tobin Creek, Barnes Creek and the Chiwaukee Prairie. Help us move this planning forward!

SE WI Clean Water Network

Got Projects? A workshop was held to help identify key projects that are now "critical" in each participating municipality. Working together with these stormwater experts, we are moving projects forward faster.

Got Wetlands? Tallgrass Land Conservation presented on the new demand for wetland banking programs and their benefits to landowners and municipalities. If you have more than 15-20 acres of property in the floodplain, this could be a lucrative option to have it restored back to wetland.
